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

Each issue, we ask a well-known person to write a letter to their 16-year old self. This issue, Andy Verity (56) a financial journalist and award-winning Economics Correspondent for BBC News takes on the challenge.

Dear younger self,

Here's something it will take you a long time to learn. Decades even. So please let me show you a shortcut. All you have to do is remember this one thing: Don't believe any story just because it feels satisfying. You may think your feelings are the best way to decide what stories to believe. It may feel like those feelings are intimately yours – dear to the kind of person you are.

But the truth about your feelings is that they aren't yours alone. They're open to manipulation. And they're a high-stakes battleground. To a corporation with something to sell, your feelings can make the difference between a loss-making failure and a profits bonanza. To a government going to war, any sympathy you may feel for the 'enemy' could be disastrous. If advertising and propaganda didn't

work, corporations and governments wouldn't put so

much effort into them. They work because our feelings, if we're not careful, can be influenced and manipulated in someone else's favour.

So defend yourself. Whatever you think the story is, if it appeals to your emotions, then that is exactly when you need to be careful. If you don't want your feelings to serve someone

else's interests, be on guard. Ask yourself a question you wouldn't normally think to ask: 'in whose interests is it that I feel this way?'

By the age of sixteen, if you've been paying attention in history lessons, you'll already know that kings, queens and popes would rather see thousands killed than tolerate a challenge to their version of the Big Story. The commitment of all believers



to the story they claimed was the truth was essential to their power. For centuries they spent huge resources trying to make everyone feel that others who rejected their version - Catholics, Protestants or Atheists - were bad people. Knowing all that, you're now busy reading godless books, listening to The Fall, the Velvet Underground and Joy Division and deciding you are no longer a born-again Christian. But what about the religion you're about to replace it with - hedonism? The attitude that makes you so fanatically devoted to cigarettes that if you spend an hour without smoking, you think your life is poor and dull? 20-a-day - sometimes 40 on a night out.

You feel that you're rebelling against that preachy, tediously conventional modern morality that says 'don't smoke! It may kill you!' and embracing the pursuit of pleasure, heedless of the consequences, like some modern-day heretic. It will take you 15 years of coughing, sluggish energy and yellowy fingers to realise that, to the makers of Marlboro Reds or Camel Lights, you're no youthful rebel. You're their loyal, devoted, highly profitable slave. And the only rebellion is against yourself.

Skip forward twenty years and you'll be in your thirties, watching in anger as overpaid bankers, let loose by a government that wishfully believed their lobbying ('deregulate the City and the economy will take off'), pumped up an enormous mortgage and house-price bubble. You'll watch as it bursts in 2008, forcing taxpayers to bail out the banks at huge expense and pitching us all into the worst economic crisis in 80 years, feeling hugely frustrated that no banker is being held to account. Then, in 2012, when authorities on both sides of the Atlantic start prosecuting traders in banks for misconduct - 'manipulating' interest rates - you'll be happy, like others, to condemn them for something you don't understand, because you feel hugely relieved that at least some

bankers are going to jail.

The story the public was fed about interest rate manipulation (the 'Libor scandal') was sold as a satisfying story of bankers being punished at last for their greed. It was only when I found explosive audio recordings, implicating the top of the financial establishment in the very same misconduct for which 37 lower-ranking bankers had been prosecuted, that I realised how misplaced my feelings had been. In fact, the evidence suggested that the real interest rate manipulation, carried out under pressure from central banks and governments on a much larger scale than the traders were jailed for, had been buried, while the prosecuted traders were innocent. In fact,




some of them had tried to blow the whistle on the big fraud ordered from on high - only to find themselves prosecuted. The story fed to the public allowed those at the top to cover up the truth while the bankers much further down the ranks took the rap and went to jail.

Our feelings about who the goodies and baddies of this story were - and who to be angry with - are being turned upside down.

So whenever there's a story you'd like to believe, be suspicious of your own wishful thinking. Ask: in whose interests is it that you should feel that way? Because the truth may feel more shocking, more revealing and much harder to believe.

The Tragic Story of Marian Beattie:

A Family's Unyielding Quest for Justice


The murder of Marian Beattie, a teenager from Portadown, Co. Armagh was a tragic and horrifying event that unfolded in 1973 in the quiet village of Aughnacloy. Despite her family's fight for justice, no one has ever been charged with the murder and some even suggest a police cover-up. Liz Scales reports.

Marian Beattie was born in 1957 in the picturesque town of Portadown, a charming locale situated just 39 km southwest of Belfast. Growing up in a close-knit family that was well respected in the community, Marian was characterised by her warmth and compassion.

Amidst the backdrop of the 1960s and 1970s, a time of tumult and change in the north, Marian's aspirations to become a nun reflected her nurturing spirit and commitment to serving others. However, like many families of larger size during that era, financial struggles loomed over the Beattie household. To support her family, Marian found employment, setting aside her childhood dreams in the face of harsh economic realities.

On the night of March 30, 1973, an air of excitement electrified the town as Marian, her older brother Isadore—a roadie for the local band Tuxedo Junction—

and her best friend Nuala Wilson prepared for an event that would turn out to be pivotal in their lives. They set off for a barn dance in Aughnacloy, a small village in Co. Tyrone with a population of about 1,000. This occasion was monumental for Marian, as it was the first time Isadore had agreed to take her along to a social event.

With high spirits, Marian and Nuala raided Marian's wardrobe, desperately searching for outfits that would make them feel grown-up. They finally settled on looks they felt captured the fun-loving spirit of the night. As they drove through the winding roads, the girls chattered excitedly, dreaming aloud of the fun that awaited them.

Upon arriving at the dance, Isadore bid the girls farewell. The barn was filled with music and laughter, and the atmosphere was vibrant with youthful energy. Marian and Nuala quickly joined the throng of dancers, their joy

contagious as they twirled around the floor. After some time, the two decided they needed a break and headed to the sidelines, relishing the moment.

It was then that Marian noticed an older man with long blonde hair watching her. Naively delighted by the attention, she nudged Nuala and flashed a smile. As

Marian sipped on her soft drink, the older man approached her, asking her to dance. A wave of nervous excitement washed over her, and she accepted his invitation to step back onto the

dance floor. They danced away into the night, lost in the rhythm of the music, Marian oblivious to the dangers that lurked in the shadows.

As the clock struck 1 a.m. and the tempo slowed to tender melodies, Marian and her dance partner decided to step outside, seeking a moment of quiet beneath the stars. As they headed out the door they came face-to-face with Isadore and his date. Isadore chatted to his sister for around four minutes and his girl spoke with Marian's date, "they seemed to know each other" Isadore stated in a recent TG4 documentary, Marú inár Measc. Isadore informed Marian that she must be back by 2am as the van would be leaving then, however, 2am came and there was no sign of her, "That just wasn't Marian.... if she told you she'd be there, she'd be there."

Isadore packed the van and he and Nuala waited but when another hour went by they realised something was not right and called the police. They then proceeded to RUC Station in Aughnacloy, once there Nuala spotted a plain-clothed policeman walk behind the counter who had had asked her to dance and Isadore observed a sense of unrest,

"There seemed to be some kind of commotion about a police officer or soldier who was missing, so they just told us to sit down and wait, but after waiting for some time

I walked up again and said, 'Listen, we need some help here, I need to find out where my sister is.'"

The RUC said there was nothing they could do until the next morning so a few hours later when it was breaking daylight the police accompanied Isadore and Nuala back to the area, but according to Isadore the policeman "drove straight to the quarry" (something he

found peculiar in retrospect) and as they stepped out, he spotted his sister lying at the bottom. Instinct kicked in and he tried to reach his sister but the police pulled him back, afraid he would destroy evidence. Burnt matches lay scattered around the teenager's body, and the

buttons of her blouse had been arranged in a chillingly meticulous manner. Isadore noticed that the descent into the quarry was difficult, and would have been especially perilous at night, perhaps suggesting someone with good local knowledge could be responsible.

That evening Isadore would identify his sister at the morgue and make the difficult decision to have a closed casket,

"as I didn't want our parents seeing the damage done to Marian."

Such omissions compounded their feelings of neglect...

Isadore and Nuala were asked to come back to the station to do a photofit, however Isadore


later stated,

"The image released to the press was nothing like how I'd described the man."

Nuala at one stage had become aggravated with the artist completing the photofit as despite imploring him to lengthen the man's hair, he seemed hesitant. After Nuala raised her voice in annoyance and declared,

"you need to make his hair much longer",

he conceded - however, the image released to the media and wider community

The case was eventually designated as a ‘Legacy’ case which the family believes led to complacency. They asserted that it should have been actively reassigned to a dedicated murder investigation team, one that could harness the latest technologies and approaches to reinvestigate the circumstances surrounding Marian’s

The weeks that followed were a whirlwind of grief and disbelief. Marian’s family grappled with a harrowing reality as they learned that she had suffered a brutal and sadistic death. The autopsy revealed that her death was caused by many areas of blunt force trauma. One such injury left a circular mark on her forehead. This was described as evidence that the injury was caused by a piece of inch and a half pipe.

death. Why has a murder with no sectarian motive been unsolved for so long?

In September 2021, a glimmer of hope surfaced when the PSNI announced that a man had voluntarily come

While the family mourned, the quest for justice transformed into an unyielding fight against time despite the fact that the police had indicated the murder would be



solved quickly. With plenty to go on, a local crime, with local knowledge required, a dancehall full of potential witnesses as to the identity of the suspect, plus forensic evidence from the crime scene, the case had a litany of potential clues but not enough it seems for this police force to solve.

forward to be interviewed concerning Marian’s murder. However, the man was not detained, and

the family learned he had been cleared based on tax records showing he was working in England at the time of Marian’s murder. The Beatties found this conclusion deeply troubling, pointing out that it does not account

for the possibility that he could have traveled back to Northern Ireland in those critical hours.

Unbelievably, five decades later, the Beattie family still finds themselves grappling with unanswered questions and a deep sense of injustice as no one has ever been brought to justice for Marian’s murder. This has led the family to question the thoroughness of the initial inquiry.

As the Beattie family pressed on, the desire for justice became a rallying cry echoing through their community.

They believed that Marian’s killer remained at large, walking among them as time passed mercilessly. Renewing their call for witnesses to come forward, the family issued a statement emphasising their frustration over the lack of progress in the investigation, “Fifty years is too long to wait for justice for a loved one,” they stated passionately, their words infused with the pain of enduring loss.

It would seem obvious that because the man was attending the local dancehall he must have been known to some of the patrons there. There were lots of people in attendance who could have been interviewed by the police, how thorough was that process? Fifty-five exhibits found at the crime scene went missing as well as some paperwork. Many are of the belief that the police were protecting someone. Was Nuala’s description too close for comfort? Did the artist and/or other colleagues

The case gained renewed attention after being highlighted in the documentary “Murder in the Badlands,” but it was disheartening for the Beattie family to note that Marian’s episode lacked contemporaneous

commentary from the PSNI. Such omissions compounded their feelings of neglect, deepening their commitment to ensure that Marian's story was not forgotten.

In a heartfelt plea, the Beatties reached out to Chief Constable Simon Byrne, requesting a meeting to discuss potential advances in the case. Their hope was for honest dialogue and assurances that action would be taken to renew investigations. They also sought a follow-up with the Police Ombudsman, requesting updates on a long-awaited report regarding the flaws in the investigation.

Darragh Mackin, the family's solicitor, characterised Marian's case as "the personification of justice delayed, justice denied." He asserted that the designation of the case as a legacy issue was a disheartening effort to sweep it under the rug, overshadowing the stark reality that a killer still roamed free. Mackin expressed his concern that critical information regarding potential suspects, some even identified as main suspects, had never been disclosed to the family, questioning the integrity of the investigative

process. Who are these suspects? Why the secrecy?

As the Beattie family stands at the intersection of hope and despair, they carry the memory of Marian with them—a reminder that, while time may march on, the fight for justice must not be forgotten. They hold steadfast in their belief that Marian's story is not just a past tragedy, but a call to action,

"If Marian could speak to you all today, we believe she would say that her soul is now in the Lord's hands," Isadore poignantly expressed, "but justice for her murder is in all of our hands."

Will the Beattie family ever receive justice for Marian? Someone out there knows something and its important this vital information is gleamed before potential witnesses pass from this world and take the secret with them. Or like too many crimes in the north, are people too afraid to come forward for fear of retribution from paramilitaries.

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A Fight for Truth

Wikipedia has been under attack. Right-wing extremists tried to change history, twist facts, and spread their own version of the truth. But they didn't expect the pushback. This is the story of how the Wikipedia community came together to defend the truth—and won.

The Secret Plot to Rewrite History

In 2007, a sharp-eyed Wikipedia user named “Eintragung ins Nichts” (“Entry into Nothingness”) noticed something strange. A group of accounts was repeatedly editing articles about World War II, right-wing extremism, and antifascism. Their changes weren't minor—they were designed to rewrite history.

The method? “Sockpuppets”—multiple fake accounts controlled by a single group—were used to make it seem like there was widespread agreement on false information. One of the biggest attempts was to introduce the term “Red Holocaust,” a phrase pushed by far-right groups to equate Nazi crimes with communist actions, watering down Germany's responsibility for the war.

Wikipedia's Community Fights Back

But Wikipedia's volunteers refused to let misinformation

win. Editors and administrators launched an investigation using special tools to track suspicious accounts. What they uncovered was shocking: more than 700 fake accounts were working together to spread false narratives.

Over three years, the Wikipedia community fought back,

banning these accounts one by one. But the attackers didn't stop. They created new accounts, found new ways to manipulate pages, and continued their attempts to twist history. What made Wikipedia's response powerful wasn't a central authority taking charge—it was

ordinary people, working together, who refused to let truth be erased.

Another Front: The Croatian Wikipedia Takeover

The battle wasn't just in German Wikipedia. In the 2010s, Croatian Wikipedia was hijacked from within. Nationalist administrators



took control, rewriting history to downplay Croatia's fascist past. Articles about the Ustaša, the country's World War II fascist movement, were whitewashed. The concentration camp Jasenovac, where thousands of Serbs, Jews, and Roma were murdered, was falsely described as a "labour camp".

Unlike in Germany, where an active community stopped the manipulation, Croatian Wikipedia was dominated by extremists for years. Editors who tried to correct falsehoods were banned. Only after public outcry from historians, journalists, and even the Wikimedia Foundation did the issue gain wider attention—but fixing the damage took years.

Why This Battle Still Matters

Wikipedia's fight against manipulation is far from over. Right-wing groups continue to try to spread their version

of history, and smaller Wikipedia editions remain especially vulnerable. But there's hope:

– **The Power of Transparency:** Because Wikipedia is open, people can detect and correct manipulation.

– **Community Matters:** Automated tools help, but human editors are the real defenders of truth.

– **We Need More Editors:** Fewer people are actively contributing to Wikipedia, making it more vulnerable to future attacks. If young people stop editing, who will protect the truth?



Wikipedia's volunteers showed that misinformation isn't unbeatable. They proved that ordinary people can stand up to organized manipulation. But their success depends on one thing: a strong, engaged community.

What is Wikipedia?

Wikipedia is a free online encyclopedia that enables users worldwide to create, edit, and update articles on a wide variety of topics. Launched in January 2001 by Jimmy Wales and Larry Sanger, it has become one of the most visited websites globally, with millions of articles available in numerous languages. Its unique collaborative model and open access principles are key to its functionality.

At its core, Wikipedia allows anyone to read and contribute, operating under the GNU Free Documentation License. Users can create accounts for additional privileges, but even unregistered users can edit most articles. The interface is user-friendly, featuring an easy-to-use visual editor and a markup code editor for more advanced users. This accessibility encourages contributions from diverse individuals, including experts and casual enthusiasts.

Community oversight is vital to Wikipedia's reliability. Articles are monitored by the user community, and

discussions occur on "talk pages" where consensus can be reached about changes. This helps ensure the accuracy and neutrality of information, with policies advocating for a neutral point of view and proper sourcing.

However, the open editing model poses risks related to misinformation and vandalism. Wikipedia employs measures such as editing restrictions on controversial articles and has a community of editors monitoring changes. Contributors must adhere to the principle of verifiability by citing reliable sources.

Overall, Wikipedia serves as an invaluable tool for education and research, providing accessible information while showcasing the power of collective knowledge and community-driven efforts. Dangerous Lies

Stephanie Alice Baker reveals how social media gave rise to fraudulent wellness influencers like Belle Gibson.

The new Netflix series *Apple Cider Vinegar* tells the story of wellness influencer Belle Gibson, who built a loyal following on social media by documenting her cancer journey online. But in 2015, Gibson was exposed as a fraud. She never had cancer, and lied about donating funds to charities and ill children.

The series documents Gibson's rise to fame and subsequent downfall, portraying some of the psychological factors that influenced her deceit. But this scandal also illustrates a larger story about the conditions

that enable cancer frauds such as Gibson to gain credibility and influence online.

The 2000s were characterised by the “blogging revolution” – a shift in how people produced and consumed information. Blogs enabled content creators to share their lives and experiences publicly, and engage directly with their readers. Niche communities formed around common interests ranging from health to heartbreak.

Gibson capitalised on this trend, creating a blog called *The Whole Pantry* where she documented her alleged journey battling a rare form of terminal brain cancer.

She claimed on her blog to have decided to reject conventional cancer treatments.

Instead, Gibson expressed that she was empowered to heal herself naturally through nutrition, determination and love – as well as alternative medicine including

Ayurvedic treatments, craniosacral therapy, oxygen therapy and colonics.

The blog was developed into an app in 2013 and a book in 2014 – with Gibson's story being legitimised

by a reputable publisher and brands, then further fuelled by her social media presence.

Gibson's primary platform of communication was Instagram. She used the photo-and-video sharing app to build and engage with her followers through inspirational quotes, personal anecdotes and evocative photographs.

Lifestyle and wellness influencers typically earn trust and intimacy by presenting themselves as authentic, accessible – and autonomous from state and corporate interests.

A quote from Gibson's book, also called *The Whole Pantry*, encapsulates the way she executed this strategy to



appeal to online followers. She wrote:

“Too many people over-edit themselves. There’s not enough honesty out there. It’s human to feel sick, to ask questions, to search for answers ... Never refine yourself in a way which takes away your heart, message and truest self.”

This persona allowed Gibson not only to achieve fame online, but to establish a parasocial relationship with her followers by distancing herself from the medical establishment, appearing relatable and unfiltered in her exchanges with followers.



The mass media has long been recognised as facilitating parasocial relationships: emotional and imaginary bonds that, despite feeling real, tend to be one-dimensional and one-sided. The original parasocial relationships were formed with media figures such as news anchors, radio hosts, and film and pop stars.

Today, content creators on social media are the primary influencers. Although these relationships are typically one-sided, they can still feel intimate and real.

The role of the wellness industry

In the aftermath of the scandal, people searched for who to blame. Fingers were pointed at the press for glamorising Gibson, as well as a publisher and other companies that failed to adequately fact-check Gibson’s claims.

Criticism was also directed at the wellness industry for peddling misinformation and pseudoscience.

There’s an assumption that wellness is mainly a female pursuit – and the Netflix series follows several female wellness influencers who have built brands around their illness and disease.

In fact, the gendered dimensions of wellness are more complicated. The original founders of the wellness

movement were male. Although many struggled to commodify wellness, they increasingly tapped into a market of women, many of whom felt justifiably unheard and overlooked by health professionals.

There’s an irony that Gibson’s wellness brand went by the Instagram handle “healing_belle”. Part of the success of the wellness industry today is derived from promising miracle cures and remedies for various forms of illness and disease. Many wellness influencers have built successful brands by commodifying health and wellbeing.

This is a far cry from the movement’s origins and the more positive conception of health they sought to establish – which aimed to operate in conjunction with medicine, rather than against it.

Gibson rose to fame in a climate of low institutional trust, where her lived experience was valued over institutional expertise. Similar to many alt-health influencers, her suspicion of conventional medicine resulted in controversial claims about vaccination, and the benefits of Gerson therapy – a regimen that claims to cure cancer through a special diet, supplements and enemas – and raw milk.

It was by documenting the negative side effects of chemotherapy and radiotherapy in her book that Gibson was able to present her lifestyle and lived experience as a hopeful alternative path to healing.

After she was convicted of misleading and deceptive conduct in 2017 and ordered by the Federal Court of Australia to pay a fine of AUS\$410,000 (£206,000), one might have expected to see a decrease in cancer frauds, given the global publicity this scandal attracted.

Instead, other high-profile cases of content

creators peddling cancer misinformation on short video platforms have emerged at an alarming rate – often using social media to monetise fake miracle cures, from apricot kernels to soursop tea.

Short-form video platforms such as TikTok, Instagram Reels and YouTube Shorts have changed the dynamics of fame. Algorithms are central to the user experience on these apps, allowing relatively unknown content creators to gain visibility and attention online.

Whereas Gibson spent years cultivating a following online, today a content creator with only a handful of followers can upload an engaging video and achieve

millions of views.

The technologies have changed, but there is an industry of content creators profiting from misleading and harmful advice. The prevalence of cancer misinformation online highlights that the problem runs much deeper than the case of Gibson, as told in Apple Cider Vinegar.

Christopher Lee:

A Legendary Career in Film and Beyond

Christopher Lee starred in more than 250 films across eight decades including the Hammer Horror, James Bond, Lord of the Rings, and Star Wars franchises. Shaun Anthony takes a look at the life of the titan of the golden age of cinema.

Early Life and Beginnings

Christopher Frank Carandini Lee was born on May 27, 1922, in Belgravia, London, to an aristocratic family. His father, Geoffrey Trollope Lee was a Lieutenant Colonel, and his mother, Countess Estelle Marie, was the daughter of a baron. Growing up in a family with such distinguished lineage, Lee's early life was marked by both privilege and tragedy. His father, who had served in the British Army during World War I, and his mother separated when he was very young. Lee's formative years were spent with his mother, and it was she who introduced him to the world of literature, opera, and film.

Lee's early education was at the prestigious Wellington College, where he was known for his striking height (he grew to be 6'5" tall), as well as his ability to excel academically. However, his passions

leaned towards the arts, particularly acting. Despite his family's background in military and nobility circles, Lee was drawn to the stage and screen. As a young man, he was inspired by the films of legendary actors such as Boris Karloff and Bela Lugosi. These cinematic experiences would later become the driving forces behind his career.



After his education, Lee's life was interrupted by the outbreak of World War II. He joined the Royal Air Force (RAF) in 1941, where he trained as a pilot, though his military service did not see him engage in combat directly as he developed optic nerve damage and could no longer fly, he could however speak fluently a range of different languages so he got pulled into the

secret service doing missions of which the facts have never been released. He also helped track down Nazi war criminals.

Lee's role in the war would have a lasting effect on him and would play a

significant part in shaping his worldview. Though he never served as a combat pilot, Lee's service with the RAF during the war marked a pivotal moment in his life, bringing him experiences that would provide depth and complexity to his acting later on.

Transition into Acting

After World War II ended, with little opportunities Lee decided to pursue a career in acting, initially finding work with Hammer Film Productions, a British company that would become synonymous with horror cinema in the 1950s and 1960s. Lee's debut film role came in 1948 with the movie *Corridors of Blood*, but it wasn't until the early 1950s that his career truly began to take shape. In 1952, Lee joined the Rank Organisation, a British film company and started to build a portfolio of roles in films such as *The Black Knight* (1954) and *The Curse of Frankenstein* (1957).

Lee's rise to fame was largely due to his role as the iconic Count Dracula in Hammer Films' *Horror of Dracula* (1958), which was one of the most successful films in the genre at the time. Lee's portrayal of the vampire count cemented his place in cinematic history, with his towering stature (6'5"), piercing gaze, and brooding presence giving the character an air of menace and mystery that distinguished him from other actors who had taken on the role. Lee would go on to

portray Dracula in a series of sequels and other Hammer horror films, including *Dracula: Prince of Darkness* (1966), *Taste the Blood of Dracula* (1970), and *The*

Satanic Rites of Dracula (1973). In addition to his portrayal of Dracula, Lee was also known for his work as Frankenstein's monster and as a villain in numerous other films. Lee's versatility as an actor allowed him to transition between various roles in horror, fantasy, and adventure genres. He became one of the defining faces of British horror cinema in the 1960s, though his filmography spanned far beyond just this genre.

Iconic Roles and Collaborations with Hammer Films

Hammer Films were pivotal in

Lee's rise to prominence. The company's brand of horror was based on lavish sets, atmospheric tension, and actors who brought strong, larger-than-life performances to the screen.

Lee's ability to portray characters with moral ambiguity—such as Dracula, Frankenstein's monster, and the Mummy—made him an invaluable asset to the studio.

His collaboration with director Terence

Fisher was particularly fruitful, with Fisher's direction helping to craft the unique, gothic aesthetic that would define many of Lee's most famous roles. Lee also worked in Europe for a couple of years where his proficiency in languages and his stature in the horror genre made him very popular. However, while Lee's work with Hammer brought him fame, it also pigeonholed him somewhat. By

the early 1970s, Lee had become frustrated with being typecast as a villain, and he sought roles in different genres to showcase his range as an actor. A particular favourite of his was *The Wicker Man*. A role specially written for him by esteemed screenwriter Anthony Shaffer. This was both a commercial and critical success. This desire for variety led him to take on more diverse roles, including performances in adventure films like *The Three Musketeers* (1973), where he played the villainous Rochefort, and *The Man with the Golden Gun* (1974), in which he portrayed the sinister assassin Francisco Scaramanga in a James Bond film (interestingly, Lee's step cousin was Ian Fleming).

Soon Hollywood beckoned and he made many appearances in Film and TV there Lee's work outside of Hammer Films began to demonstrate his versatility and willingness to take on complex characters. He proved that he was more than just a figure of terror, venturing into epic action, adventure, and fantasy, all while maintaining his commanding presence on screen.

The Lord of the Rings and Star Wars: A New Chapter

Lee's career reached a new pinnacle in the late 1990s and early 2000s, when he joined the cast of *The Lord of the Rings* trilogy (2001–2003) directed by Peter Jackson

(interestingly, he is the only person in the *Lord of the Rings* films to have met JRR Tolkien). Playing Saruman the White, Lee's performance as a once-noble wizard who succumbs to darkness was lauded for its gravitas and complexity. His portrayal of Saruman became one of the defining aspects of the trilogy, with Lee's deep voice and imposing stature contributing significantly to the character's sense of authority and corruption. For a man who had spent decades playing villains, Saruman provided Lee with a character that was multifaceted, allowing him to explore the moral complexities of his role.

Shortly after, Lee found himself in another major franchise, playing the Sith Lord Count Dooku in *Star Wars: Episode II – Attack*


of the Clones (2002) and *Star Wars: Episode III – Revenge of the Sith* (2005), directed by George Lucas.

As Count Dooku, Lee once again portrayed a powerful antagonist, though his role was more nuanced than many of the villains he had played earlier in

his career. His performances in both *The Lord of the Rings* and *Star Wars* showcased a newfound international appeal for Lee, attracting a new generation of fans while solidifying his legacy as one of the greatest character actors in cinema.

The Enduring Legacy of Christopher Lee

Beyond his cinematic accomplishments, Lee was known for his multifaceted talents and interests. He was an

accomplished musician, recording several heavy metal albums in his later years, including *Charlemagne: By the Sword and the Cross* (2010), a concept album based on the life of Charlemagne - holding the record as the oldest person to get on the *Billboard* music charts with a Heavy Metal album. He was a talented swordsman (and was in an Errol

Flynn movie showcasing his skills), an expert knife thrower and he also possessed a lifelong interest in opera, particularly the works of Richard Wagner, which informed his performances and provided him with a deep appreciation for storytelling and drama.

Additionally,

Lee was known for his deep voice, which was frequently used for narration, and he even recorded readings of literary classics.

Lee's personal life was also remarkable. He married Danish painter Birgit Kroencke in 1961, and the couple had one daughter, Christina. Despite his towering screen presence, Lee was known to be a humble, thoughtful man in his personal life. His love of history, literature, and classical music often influenced the roles he chose, and he was dedicated to preserving the legacy of classic cinema.

As Lee's back catalogue attracted the Gen Zs, a rumour started online that he was an occultist and had over 20,000 occult books in his library, however, at a talk at University College Dublin, Lee confirmed that this was completely erroneous, "Somebody wrote that I had 20,000 [occult] books. I don't—I'd have to live in a bath!"

He went on to caution the students against involving themselves in occult practices, claiming, "I have met people who claim to be Satanists, who claim

to be involved with black magic, who claimed that they knew a lot about it. I certainly have not been involved and I warn all of you: never, never, never get involved - you will not only lose your mind: you lose your soul." Christopher Lee continued to work in film until the very end of his life. He made appearances in films such as

The Hobbit: An Unexpected Journey (2012) and *The Hobbit: The Battle of the Five Armies* (2014), where he reprised his role as Saruman. Tragically, Lee passed away on June 7, 2015, at the age of 93, from heart failure. His wife delayed the public announcement until 11 June, informing his family of the death before releasing the news to the press.

Following Lee's death, fans, friends, actors, directors and others involved in the film industry publicly gave their personal tributes. Then British Prime Minister David Cameron

praised Lee as a "titan of the golden age of cinema". He was honoured by the academy at the 88th Academy Awards on February 28 2016 in the annual in Memoriam section.

Lee has left behind a legacy that spanned nearly seven decades. He had been active up until the end, working on film projects and continuing to engage with his fans worldwide. His extraordinary career in film and his contributions to the entertainment industry have left an indelible mark on the cinematic world. From his early days in British horror to his iconic roles in *The Lord of the Rings* and *Star Wars*, Lee's diverse body of work showcased his versatility, his ability to bring complexity to even the most sinister characters, and his enduring dedication to his craft. His film legacy and his influence will continue to resonate with audiences for generations to come.

Get Healthy & Happy with your Pet

Jacqueline Boyd looks at five ways to get healthier (and happier) with your pet.

This article was written with the help of my pets. When I lost focus or started to tire, I grabbed my dogs' leads and they happily joined me for some fresh air and a little outdoor adventure. I freely admit that my pets help my own health, productivity and happiness – and I hope I help them to be happy and healthy too.

It's widely recognised that pets can help support humans' health and wellbeing – but the benefits should be mutual. Our pets are sentient beings who deserve to be treated with care and respect, not as tools to support humans' wellbeing to the detriment of their own.

Given that many countries, including the US, UK and Ireland are currently facing an obesity crisis in both humans and pets, what can owners do to ensure they aren't unintentionally damaging the health of their pets while relying on them for comfort and companionship?

Here are five ways for you and your pet to get healthier and happier together.



1. Rest and relaxation

Companion animals can help relieve stress and distress. Research has shown that the physical presence of a dog can reduce humans' blood pressure and heart rate during a demanding task – more so than the presence of a family member or friend. However, people asked to undertake stressful tasks in the presence of a friendly, but unknown, animal didn't reveal any benefits.

Pets, then, can be an important source of comfort, security and support – a safe haven – for their owners.

But pets, too, find solace in their humans. They can be calmed by their presence and enjoy affection; however, intense human-animal interaction can also lead to attachment issues, making them prone to aggression, fear and separation anxiety.

For some pets, too much handling, or inappropriate petting, can be stressful and frightening and lead to aggression or anxiety.

Some owners even prefer to share a bed with their pets. There are potential health implications for sleeping alongside an animal, including disturbed sleep and the possibility of injury, disease transmission or allergies.

However, sleeping with your pet may also support good quality sleep as well as warmth, security, and companionship. Many pets seem to prefer to sleep in close proximity to others, so there might be a mutual benefit too.

2. Relationship building

Relationship building is essential for both owner and pet to maintain good health. A positive human-pet relationship is one that acknowledges owner responsibility for pet welfare and wellbeing. Conversely, dysfunctional relationships with pets can lead to trauma and aggression. Caregivers with less friendly or poorly behaved dogs can suffer from anxiety and depression.

It's important to train pets using methods that help nurture a positive partnership between human and animal. This can also help both owner and pet have a more optimistic outlook on life. Research has shown that positive reinforcement training as opposed to punishment-based methods is the best approach for animal welfare and skills acquisition.

Strong human-pet relationships can often be seen in assistance and therapy animals. Therapy pets are linked to improvements in independence and reported wellbeing of their owners. Stroking and interacting with therapy pets is beneficial for patients in healthcare

facilities, where pets can create a sense of normality, reduce boredom and help alleviate depression.

3. Making (two and four legged) friends



Taking your pet out for a walk might have more health benefits than just exercise.

Pets can help foster friendships and relationships – and build a sense of community. Pet owners, for instance, are more likely to get to know other people in their local area.

Why is this?

Research suggests that pets have a profound effect on “social lubrication” helping create relationships with other pet owners and animal lovers.

Pet owners, then, are less likely to experience loneliness and social isolation than people with no pets.

4. Dietary decisions

Vets agree that the average waistline of pets is getting larger. This mimics what is happening in the human population – and diet and exercise are two major contributory factors.

The incidence of obesity in pet dogs – but not cats – is linked to the waistline of the owner, suggesting a causal lifestyle relationship. So, owners tend to unintentionally damage their pets' health because of same poor diet and exercise habits that cause their own health issues.

By supporting people to make better dietary decisions for their pets, it might also be possible to encourage healthier eating for the human.

Combining improved diet with regular exercise might reduce the waistlines of pets and people to a

healthy size.

5. Walking for wellness

Regular physical activity is associated with many health benefits, both for people and pets. Walking is cost effective and relatively accessible way for most dog owners to improve the physical health and general wellbeing of both humans and their pets.

For example, regular dog walkers have lower body masses and higher levels of physical activity than people without dogs, or those who do not walk the dogs they live with. Also, walking at least three times a week can ease back pain and reduce the risk of recurrence by half.

However, not everyone regularly walks their dog. This can be because of a lack of suitable places, safety concerns or even worries about their own or

other dogs' behaviour. Making facilities accessible, safe and user-friendly for all can encourage activity. This includes provision of "poo bins" to reduce dog fouling, neighbourhood design that supports safe walking opportunities and restricted access to potentially sensitive areas such as children's playgrounds.

Ultimately, living with a companion animal should be a mutually beneficial, healthy and happy relationship. Following these five guidelines should help owners and their pets to find comfort and calm in each other and maintain a healthy weight and outlook.



Liz Scales takes a look at the life and legacy of Irish republican politician Cathal Brugha who was active in the Easter Rising, the Irish War of Independence, the Irish Civil War and was the first chairperson of Dáil Éireann as well as the president of Dáil Éireann

Cathal Brugha, originally named Charles William St. John Burgess, was born in Fairview, Dublin, on 18th July 1874. He was the tenth of fourteen children—four sons and ten daughters—born to Thomas Burgess and Maryanne Burgess (née Flynn). Thomas was a cabinet maker and antique dealer originally from Carlow, and although he was Protestant, his wife's Catholicism left a lasting impression on their children, who were raised as Catholics. Among them, young Charles emerged as the most devout member of the family.



start working as a clerk for a church supplies company called Hayes & Finch. Later, he transitioned into a role as a traveling salesman.

Despite his small stature, Cathal exhibited remarkable strength and athleticism. He excelled in various sports, including boxing, swimming, cycling, gymnastics, cricket, and rugby. Known for his steely determination, he abstained from smoking, drinking, and

The Burgess household was characterised by a strong nationalist sentiment. Thomas Burgess was noted for his ardent support of Parnell and possibly even aligned with the Fenian movement. Brugha's early education began at the Colmkillie Schools on Dominick Street, after which he entered Belvedere College in 1888 with the intent of pursuing medicine. However, this ambition was cut short in 1890 due to the failure of his father's business, forcing him to

swearing, focusing intently on his passions.

Despite his deep commitment to the republican cause, Brugha viewed himself primarily as a soldier and harboured a suspicion of political manoeuvring.

Engagement with Irish Culture

Brugha joined the Gaelic League in 1899, where he quickly became fluent in Irish and embraced Gaelic culture. He eventually adopted the Irish name "Cathal Brugha," reflecting his deepening commitment to his

heritage. By 1908, Brugha had ascended to the position of president of the League's Keating branch, promoting Irish language and culture, which became a vibrant hub of separatism.

In 1909, while attending a Gaelic League meeting in Birr, King's County (now Offaly), he met Kathleen Kingston, and the couple married on 8th February 1912, in Dublin.

Sensing the dissonance of working for an English-owned firm, Brugha and two colleagues, Anthony and Vincent Lalor, established Lalor Ltd., a candle-making company at Lower Ormond Quay, where Brugha served as a director and salesman.

Throughout this time, Brugha's political aspirations

burgeoned, and he joined the Irish Republican Brotherhood (IRB) in 1908, leveraging his professional connections to recruit supporters. In November 1913, he was appointed first lieutenant of C Company in the 4th Battalion of the Irish Volunteers. By the spring of 1914, Brugha had become the battalion adjutant and played a crucial role in the significant event where volunteers landed a shipment of arms at Howth on 26th July of that year.

Involvement in the 1916 Easter Rising

During the pivotal 1916 Easter Rising, Brugha served as the vice-commandant under Eamonn Ceannt, overseeing the 4th Battalion's defence of South Dublin Union. In a fierce engagement on 27th April, Brugha was badly wounded, becoming isolated from his unit. Despite sustaining multiple gunshot and shrapnel wounds, he valiantly held off a significant number of British troops. When found by Ceannt, Brugha was propped against a wall, injured but defiant, singing 'God Save Ireland' as he taunted his attackers.

After the battle, he was transported to hospital and ultimately released in August 1916, diagnosed as incurable. Following a long and painful recovery, during which he dealt with mobility issues and persistent pain, Brugha began to mobilise efforts to revive the Irish Volunteers.

Political and Military Career

In November 1916, he convened a conference of approximately fifty Volunteers in Dublin, marking the resurgence of the organisation. Brugha was arrested during a public demonstration in June 1917, where he demanded the release

of political prisoners, but later returned to active service. His fervent republican sentiments led to his election to the party executive at the Sinn Féin convention in October 1917, where he was instrumental in advocating for a republican constitution.

Despite his deep commitment to the republican cause, Brugha viewed himself primarily as a soldier and harboured a suspicion of political manoeuvring. His focus remained on arming and reorganising the Irish Volunteers, serving as their chief of staff from October 1917 to April 1919. During the conscription crisis of spring 1918, Brugha opposed Sinn Féin's collaboration with the Irish Parliamentary Party, prompting his resignation from the party's executive.

Brugha organised an expedition to London with twelve Volunteers aiming to assassinate British ministers if conscription was imposed. His tenure in the political arena culminated in his election as a TD for Waterford in December 1918. Following the imprisonment of Éamon de Valera and Arthur Griffith, Brugha was temporarily elected acting president of the first Dáil Éireann on January 22, 1919. By April, he resigned in favour of de

Valera and was subsequently appointed Minister for Defence.

nominal military subordinate. Their complex relationship was marred by mutual resentment and competition over control of defence matters, further muddling their working dynamic.

Leadership Challenges and Internal Conflicts

Brugha's leadership was marked by extensive challenges, mainly due to his strict disciplinary approach and his insistence on Dáil approval for military actions. He was adamant about avoiding civilian casualties and only reluctantly approved attacks on police and intelligence officers. Nonetheless, his limited engagement with the Irish Republican Army (IRA) often led others to view him as disconnected from the realities of their efforts on the ground.

On August 20, 1919, Brugha proposed an oath of allegiance to the Irish Republic for both Volunteers and Dáil deputies, an initiative that saw varying degrees of acceptance but was never formally ratified by the IRA. In an impactful moment before the infamous Bloody Sunday on November 21, 1920, he intervened to remove suspected names from Collins's assassination list, citing insufficient evidence against them.

In a bid to diminish the IRB's influence within the IRA, Brugha resigned from the IRB in the wake of the 1916 Rising. He believed that the military council's authority conflict undermined the nationalist movement during the rebellion and felt that, as republicanism grew, there was little need for secrecy. This suspicion extended to Michael Collins, who was both an IRB head and Brugha's



Opposition to the Anglo-Irish Treaty

Brugha's opposition grew increasingly vocal during the negotiations that ensued after the war of independence. He made a deliberate choice not to join the delegation negotiating with the British in September 1921,

preferring to remain outside the realm of failure should talks collapse and violence resume. As discussions unfolded, de Valera reached out to Brugha, hoping to persuade him toward accepting the concept of 'external association' with the British Commonwealth, which Brugha grudgingly considered.

When the Anglo-Irish Treaty was presented, Brugha vehemently opposed it, arguing on 7th January 1922, that it represented "national suicide," an assertion he believed compromised the independent republic proclaimed in 1916 and ratified in 1919. He launched a fierce attack on Collins, questioning his contributions and portraying him as a secondary figure within the Department of Defence, a move that alienated some within the anti-treaty faction.

Brugha's harsh critique of Collins drew ire even from some fellow anti-treatyites, ultimately damaging his reputation more than that of Collins, who retained considerable public favor. Following the Dáil's approval of the Treaty, Brugha was succeeded as Minister for Defence

by Richard Mulcahy.

The Civil War and Legacy

In March 1922, Brugha became vice-president of the anti-treaty Cumann na Poblachta, striving to temper extremist behaviours within the faction. He opposed radical proposals at the anti-treaty IRA conference and advocated for restraint even as political tensions rose. Yet, in June, he was elected as TD for Waterford–Tipperary East, suggesting that his influence still resonated among constituents.

As the civil war erupted on 28th June, following the shelling of the Four Courts, Brugha reported for duty at the Hammam hotel, taken over by anti-treaty forces. Despite intense gunfire enveloping the area, Brugha remained resolute. In a desperate charge into the streets while exchanging fire, he sustained serious injuries, culminating in a gunshot wound to his thigh.

Brugha succumbed to his injuries on 7th July 1922, in the Mater Hospital in Dublin, and was laid to rest in the republican plot at Glasnevin Cemetery. He left behind his wife, Caitlín Brugha, who served as a Sinn Féin TD from 1923 to 1927, along with five daughters and a son, Ruairí, born in 1917, who later became a Fianna Fáil TD for South County Dublin.

In an era populated by passionate individuals fighting for their beliefs, Cathal Brugha's zeal was particularly remarkable. He remained immovable on principles and was characterised by an intense fixation on the republic he envisioned. Following his death, tributes revealed a complex legacy: a blend of admiration for his tenacity and frustration over his relentless intransigence. Piaras Béaslaí, a once-close friend, poignantly described Brugha's courage as "leonine," yet tempered by an "almost taurine obstinacy." As Collins reflected on Brugha, stating, "He was a fanatic in a noble cause," he emphasised the rarity of Brugha's commitment, suggesting that long after others had faded into obscurity, Brugha would be remembered as a staunch advocate for Ireland's freedom.


Burn After Reading – Catherine Ryan Howard – Bantam


The Morrigan – Kim Curran – Michael Joseph


